It is enacted by the General Assembly as follows:

1	SECTION 1. Title 23 of the General Laws entitled "HEALTH AND SAFETY" is hereby
2	amended by adding thereto the following chapter:
3	<u>CHAPTER 17.28</u>
4	OVERSIGHT OF RISK-BEARING PROVIDER ORGANIZATIONS
5	23-17.28-1. Purpose.
6	The legislature declares that:
7	(1) It is in the best interest of the public that health care provider organizations that accept
8	financial risk for the delivery of health care services in our state meet the standards of this chapter
9	to ensure that patient access to health care services and continuity of care are not unnecessarily
10	interrupted; and
11	(2) It is a vital state function to establish these standards for the conduct of health care
12	provider organizations in Rhode Island; and
13	(3) Nothing in this legislation is intended to change the obligation of providers or insurers
14	to comply with the provisions of title 27.
15	23-17.28-2. Definitions.
16	As used in this chapter:
17	(1) "Commissioner" means the health insurance commissioner.
18	(2) "Health care risk contract" means a health care contract that holds the provider

•	organization intelleding responsible for a negotiated portion of an ecosts that exceed the
2	predetermined health care services budget and thereby transfers insurer risk to the provider
3	organization.
4	(3) "Health insurer" means every nonprofit medical service corporation, hospital service
5	corporation, health maintenance organization, or other insurer offering or insuring health
6	services; the term shall in addition include any entity defined as an insurer under § 42-62-4 and
7	any third-party administrator when interacting with health care providers and enrollees on behalf
8	of the insurer.
9	(4) "Provider organization" means any corporation, partnership, business trust
10	association, or organized group of persons in the business of health care delivery or management
11	whether incorporated or not, that represents one or more health care providers in contracting with
12	health insurers for the payments of health care services. "Provider organization" shall include, but
13	not be limited to, physician organizations, physician-hospital organizations, independent practice
14	associations, provider networks, accountable care organizations, systems of care, and any other
15	organization that contracts with health insurers for payment for health care services.
16	(5) "Risk-bearing provider organization" means a provider organization that has entered
17	into a health care risk contract to manage the treatment of a group of patients. For the purposes of
18	this chapter, Programs of All-Inclusive Care for the Elderly (PACE) shall not be considered a
19	provider organization.
20	23-17.28-3. Certification for provider organizations entering into health care risk
21	contracts for Medicaid enrollees.
22	(a) The commissioner shall, with the express agreement of the Medicaid program.
23	establish a process for certifying provider organizations that intend to enter into health care risk
24	contracts for Medicaid enrollees.
25	(b) The commissioner shall by regulation establish standards for certification, including
26	the forms and information required to apply for certification. The standards may consider the
27	provider organization's financial position, corporate structure, or other characteristics.
28	(c) The commissioner shall issue a finding regarding certification within sixty (60) days
29	of the receipt of a complete request pursuant to subsection (b) of this section. If the commissioner
30	denies the request for certification, the commissioner will state the reasons for the denial in
31	writing, and the provider organization may reapply without prejudice.
32	23-17.28-4. Financial solvency filing and review.
33	(a) Review of financial solvency.
34	(1) The commissioner shall establish a process for reviewing the financial solvency of

1	risk-bearing provider organizations according to the standards established under subsection (b) of
2	this section. The commissioner will utilize standardized forms and streamlined procedures to the
3	extent possible in an effort to minimize the administrative burden on health insurers and risk-
4	bearing provider organizations in order to comply with this chapter.
5	(2) The commissioner shall issue a finding regarding financial solvency within sixty (60)
6	days of the receipt of a complete filing pursuant to subsection (c) or (d) of this section. The
7	commissioner shall find one of the following:
8	(i) The risk-bearing provider organization meets the standards of financial solvency.
9	(ii) The risk-bearing provider organization does not meet the standards of financial
10	solvency. Such a finding may be appealed pursuant to the administrative procedures act, chapter
11	35 of title 42.
12	(3) Regardless of the findings pursuant to subsection (a)(2) of this section, the
13	commissioner may include additional observations concerning the risk-bearing provider
14	organization's financial solvency, including the identification of material risks facing the provider
15	organization.
16	(b) The commissioner shall establish standards for evaluating financial solvency of risk-
17	bearing provider organizations. The standards will consider all the health care risk contracts that a
18	provider organization has entered into at the time of a financial solvency review and will be based
19	on factors directly related to the risk-bearing provider organization's financial viability,
20	experience managing risk, and risk mitigation strategies to cover potential losses under health
21	care risk contracts.
22	(c) Within thirty (30) days of first executing a health care risk contract, a provider
23	organization shall submit to the commissioner a financial report, and any other materials
24	necessary to support the financial solvency review. The commissioner shall establish the form
25	and content of this filing by regulation, including, but not limited to:
26	(1) Material terms of all the health care risk contracts that a provider organization has
27	entered into at the time of a financial solvency review; and
28	(2) The provider organization's assets, liabilities, reserves, sources of working capital,
29	and other sources of financial support.
30	Materials submitted under this subsection shall be considered confidential and privileged
31	commercial information for the purposes of § 38-2-2(4)(B) and shall not be deemed public
32	records. This requirement shall not apply to any risk-bearing provider organization that has
33	submitted materials under subsection (d) of this section within the previous twelve (12) months.
34	(d) Risk-bearing provider organizations shall annually submit to the commissioner a

1	financial report, and any other materials necessary to support the financial solvency review. The
2	commissioner shall establish the timing, form, and content of this filing by regulation, including,
3	but not limited to:
4	(1) Material terms of all the health care risk contracts that a provider organization has
5	entered into at the time of a financial solvency review; and
6	(2) The provider organization's assets, liabilities, reserves, sources of working capital,
7	and other sources of financial support.
8	Materials submitted under this subsection shall be considered confidential and privileged
9	commercial information for the purposes of § 38-2-2(4)(B) and shall not be deemed public
10	records.
11	(e) If the commissioner has established one or more categories of risk contracts under §
12	42-14.5-3(t), the commissioner shall establish standards and requirements for risk-bearing
13	provider organizations that have entered into specific categories of risk contracts. The
14	commissioner may waive all requirements for certain risk contracts or categories of risk contracts
15	based on a determination that such contracts pose little risk to consumers.
16	23-17.28-5. Corrective action plan.
17	(a) If the commissioner finds that a risk-bearing provider organization does not meet the
18	standards of financial solvency under § 23-17.28-4(a):
19	(1) The commissioner will identify specific deficiencies with respect to the standards of
20	financial solvency that need to be addressed by the risk-bearing provider organization.
21	(2) The commissioner will notify the executive office of health and human services and
22	any health insurers that have informed the office of the health insurance commissioner that they
23	are holding health care risk contracts with the provider organization.
24	(3) The risk-bearing provider organization will establish a corrective action plan to
25	address the deficiencies identified by the commissioner, submit the plan to the commissioner, and
26	update the commissioner on the status of corrective on actions an ongoing basis as requested. The
27	commissioner may establish standards for such corrective action plans by regulation.
28	(b) Ninety (90) days following a finding that a risk-bearing provider organization does
29	not meet the standards of financial solvency under § 23-17.28-4(a), the risk-bearing provider
30	organization shall demonstrate compliance with the corrective action plan under subsection (a)(3)
31	of this section.
32	23-17.28-6. Prohibition on contracting with certain risk-bearing provider
33	organizations.
34	(a) If the commissioner has issued a finding that a risk-bearing provider organization

1	does not meet the standards of financial solvency, the provider organization may not enter into or
2	renew a health care risk contract without prior approval of the commissioner until such time as
3	the commissioner issues a finding that the provider organization meets the standards of financial
4	solvency.
5	(b) A provider organization may not enter into or renew a health care risk contract for
6	Medicaid members if the provider organization has not been certified under § 23-17.28-3.
7	23-17.28-7. Duty to update.
8	Risk-bearing provider organizations that have previously submitted an annual financial
9	report to the commissioner under § 23-17.28-4(c) shall:
10	(1) Notify the commissioner within thirty (30) days of any material changes to its
11	financial position, including changes to health care risk contracts that increase the amount of risk
12	borne by the provider organization, or reduces risk mitigation, such as through a reduction in stop
13	loss insurance coverage; and
14	(2) Notify the commissioner within two (2) days should the risk-bearing organization
15	become insolvent, or recognize it is in the process of becoming insolvent.
16	23-17.28-8. Administrative penalties.
17	(a) Whenever the commissioner shall have cause to believe that a violation of this section
18	has occurred by any provider organization, the commissioner may, in accordance with the
19	requirements of the administrative procedures act, chapter 35 of title 42:
20	(1) Levy an administrative penalty in an amount not less than one thousand dollars
21	(\$1000) nor more than fifty thousand dollars (\$50,000);
22	(2) Order the violator to cease such actions;
23	(3) Require the provider organization to take such actions as are necessary to comply
24	with this section, or the regulations thereunder; or
25	(4) Any combination of the above penalties.
26	(b) Any monetary penalties assessed pursuant to this section shall be deposited as general
27	revenues.
28	SECTION 2. Section 27-20.9-1 of the General Laws in Chapter 27-20.9 entitled
29	"Contract With Health Care Providers" is hereby amended to read as follows:
30	27-20.9-1. Health care contracts Required provisions Definitions.
31	(a) On and after January 1, 2008, a health insurer that contracts with a health care
32	provider shall comply with the provisions of this chapter and shall include the provisions required
33	by this chapter in the health care contract. A contract in existence prior to January 1, 2008, that is
34	renewed or renews by its terms shall comply with the provisions of this chapter no later than

2	(b) As used in this chapter, unless the context otherwise requires:
3	(1) "Health care contract" means a contract entered into or renewed between a health
4	insurer and a health care provider for the delivery of health care services to others.
5	(2) "Health care provider" means a person licensed or certified in this state to practice
6	medicine, pharmacy, chiropractic, nursing, physical therapy, podiatry, dentistry, optometry,
7	occupational therapy, or other healing arts.
8	(3) "Health care risk contract" means a health care contract that holds the provider
9	organization financially responsible for a negotiated portion or all of the costs that exceed a
10	predetermined health care services budget and thereby transfers insurer risk to the provider
11	organization.
12	(3)(4) "Health insurer" means every nonprofit medical service corporation, hospital
13	service corporation, health maintenance organization, or other insurer offering and/or insuring
14	health services; the term shall in addition include any entity defined as an insurer under § 42-62-4
15	and any third-party administrator when interacting with health care providers and enrollees on
16	behalf of such an insurer.
17	(5) "Provider organization" means any corporation, partnership, business, trust.
18	association, or organized group of persons in the business of health care delivery or management
19	whether incorporated or not that represents one or more health care providers in contracting with
20	health insurers for the payments of health care services. "Provider organization" shall include, but
21	not be limited to, physician organizations, physician-hospital organizations, independent practice
22	associations, provider networks, accountable care organizations, systems of care, and any other
23	organization that contracts with health insurers for payment for health care services.
24	(6) "Risk-bearing provider organization" means a provider organization that has entered
25	into a health care risk contract to manage the treatment of a group of patients. For the purposes of
26	this chapter, Programs of All-Inclusive Care for the Elderly (PACE) shall not be considered a
27	provider organization.
28	SECTION 3. Chapter 27-20.9 of the General Laws entitled "Contract With Health Care
29	Providers" is hereby amended by adding thereto the following section:
30	27-20.9-4. Health care risk contracts.
31	(a) A health insurer shall submit information about each health care risk contract as
32	directed by the health insurance commissioner in regulation. The commissioner will utilize
33	standardized forms and streamlined procedures to the extent possible in an effort to minimize the
34	administrative burden on health insurers and risk-bearing provider organizations in order to

1	comply with this chapter.
2	(b) A health insurer shall submit health care risk contracts and relevant related material to
3	the commissioner within thirty (30) days of a request of such information. Such contracts shall be
4	considered confidential and privileged commercial information for the purposes of § 38-2-2(4)(B
5	and shall not be deemed public records.
6	(c) A health insurer shall not enter into or renew a health care risk contract with a
7	provider organization for which the commissioner has issued a finding that the provider
8	organization does not meet the standards of financial solvency under § 23-17.28-4, until such
9	time as the commissioner issues a finding that the provider organization meets the standards or
10	financial solvency.
11	(d) A health insurer shall not enter into or renew a health care risk contract for Medicaio
12	members with a provider organization that has not been certified as provided in § 23-17.28-3.
13	(e) Each health insurer shall provide the commissioner with a list of all provide
14	organizations with which it has entered into a health care risk contract on an annual basis. If the
15	commissioner has established one or more categories of risk contracts under § 42-14.5-3(t), the
16	health insurer will indicate which category of risk contract each risk-bearing provide
17	organization holds.
18	(f) The commissioner may establish additional requirements for health care risk contracts
19	by regulation.
20	SECTION 4. Section 42-14.5-3 of the General Laws in Chapter 42-14.5 entitled "The
21	Rhode Island Health Care Reform Act of 2004 - Health Insurance Oversight" is hereby amended
22	to read as follows:
23	<u>42-14.5-3. Powers and duties.</u>
24	The health insurance commissioner shall have the following powers and duties:
25	(a) To conduct quarterly public meetings throughout the state, separate and distinct from
26	rate hearings pursuant to § 42-62-13, regarding the rates, services, and operations of insurers
27	licensed to provide health insurance in the state; the effects of such rates, services, and operations
28	on consumers, medical care providers, patients, and the market environment in which the insurers
29	operate; and efforts to bring new health insurers into the Rhode Island market. Notice of not less
30	than ten (10) days of the hearing(s) shall go to the general assembly, the governor, the Rhode
31	Island Medical Society, the Hospital Association of Rhode Island, the director of health, the

attorney general, and the chambers of commerce. Public notice shall be posted on the

department's website and given in the newspaper of general circulation, and to any entity in

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writing requesting notice.

(b) To make recommendations to the governor and the house of representatives and senate finance committees regarding health-care insurance and the regulations, rates, services, administrative expenses, reserve requirements, and operations of insurers providing health insurance in the state, and to prepare or comment on, upon the request of the governor or chairpersons of the house or senate finance committees, draft legislation to improve the regulation of health insurance. In making the recommendations, the commissioner shall recognize that it is the intent of the legislature that the maximum disclosure be provided regarding the reasonableness of individual administrative expenditures as well as total administrative costs. The commissioner shall make recommendations on the levels of reserves, including consideration of: targeted reserve levels; trends in the increase or decrease of reserve levels; and insurer plans for distributing excess reserves.

- (c) To establish a consumer/business/labor/medical advisory council to obtain information and present concerns of consumers, business, and medical providers affected by health-insurance decisions. The council shall develop proposals to allow the market for small business health insurance to be affordable and fairer. The council shall be involved in the planning and conduct of the quarterly public meetings in accordance with subsection (a). The advisory council shall develop measures to inform small businesses of an insurance complaint process to ensure that small businesses that experience rate increases in a given year may request and receive a formal review by the department. The advisory council shall assess views of the health-provider community relative to insurance rates of reimbursement, billing, and reimbursement procedures, and the insurers' role in promoting efficient and high-quality health care. The advisory council shall issue an annual report of findings and recommendations to the governor and the general assembly and present its findings at hearings before the house and senate finance committees. The advisory council is to be diverse in interests and shall include representatives of community consumer organizations; small businesses, other than those involved in the sale of insurance products; and hospital, medical, and other health-provider organizations. Such representatives shall be nominated by their respective organizations. The advisory council shall be co-chaired by the health insurance commissioner and a community consumer organization or small business member to be elected by the full advisory council.
- (d) To establish and provide guidance and assistance to a subcommittee ("the professional-provider-health-plan work group") of the advisory council created pursuant to subsection (c), composed of health-care providers and Rhode Island licensed health plans. This subcommittee shall include in its annual report and presentation before the house and senate finance committees the following information:

1 (1) A method whereby health plans shall disclose to contracted providers the fee 2 schedules used to provide payment to those providers for services rendered to covered patients; 3 (2) A standardized provider application and credentials-verification process, for the 4 purpose of verifying professional qualifications of participating health-care providers; 5 (3) The uniform health plan claim form utilized by participating providers; (4) Methods for health maintenance organizations, as defined by § 27-41-2, and nonprofit 6 hospital or medical-service corporations, as defined by chapters 19 and 20 of title 27, to make 7 8 facility-specific data and other medical service-specific data available in reasonably consistent 9 formats to patients regarding quality and costs. This information would help consumers make 10 informed choices regarding the facilities and clinicians or physician practices at which to seek 11 care. Among the items considered would be the unique health services and other public goods 12 provided by facilities and clinicians or physician practices in establishing the most appropriate 13 cost comparisons; 14 (5) All activities related to contractual disclosure to participating providers of the 15 mechanisms for resolving health plan/provider disputes; 16 (6) The uniform process being utilized for confirming, in real time, patient insurance 17 enrollment status, benefits coverage, including co-pays and deductibles; 18 (7) Information related to temporary credentialing of providers seeking to participate in 19 the plan's network and the impact of the activity on health-plan accreditation; 20 (8) The feasibility of regular contract renegotiations between plans and the providers in 21 their networks; and 22 (9) Efforts conducted related to reviewing impact of silent PPOs on physician practices. 23 (e) To enforce the provisions of Title 27 and Title 42 as set forth in § 42-14-5(d). 24 (f) To provide analysis of the Rhode Island affordable health plan reinsurance fund. The 25 fund shall be used to effectuate the provisions of §§ 27-18.5-9 and 27-50-17. (g) To analyze the impact of changing the rating guidelines and/or merging the individual 26 health-insurance market, as defined in chapter 18.5 of title 27, and the small-employer-health-27 28 insurance market, as defined in chapter 50 of title 27, in accordance with the following: 29 (1) The analysis shall forecast the likely rate increases required to effect the changes 30 recommended pursuant to the preceding subsection (g) in the direct-pay market and small-31 employer-health-insurance market over the next five (5) years, based on the current rating 32 structure and current products. 33 (2) The analysis shall include examining the impact of merging the individual and small-

employer markets on premiums charged to individuals and small-employer groups.

(3) The analysis shall include examining the impact on rates in each of the individual and small-employer health-insurance markets and the number of insureds in the context of possible changes to the rating guidelines used for small-employer groups, including: community rating principles; expanding small-employer rate bonds beyond the current range; increasing the employer group size in the small-group market; and/or adding rating factors for broker and/or tobacco use.

- (4) The analysis shall include examining the adequacy of current statutory and regulatory oversight of the rating process and factors employed by the participants in the proposed, new merged market.
- (5) The analysis shall include assessment of possible reinsurance mechanisms and/or federal high-risk pool structures and funding to support the health-insurance market in Rhode Island by reducing the risk of adverse selection and the incremental insurance premiums charged for this risk, and/or by making health insurance affordable for a selected at-risk population.
- (6) The health insurance commissioner shall work with an insurance market merger task force to assist with the analysis. The task force shall be chaired by the health insurance commissioner and shall include, but not be limited to, representatives of the general assembly, the business community, small-employer carriers as defined in § 27-50-3, carriers offering coverage in the individual market in Rhode Island, health-insurance brokers, and members of the general public.
- (7) For the purposes of conducting this analysis, the commissioner may contract with an outside organization with expertise in fiscal analysis of the private-insurance market. In conducting its study, the organization shall, to the extent possible, obtain and use actual health-plan data. Said data shall be subject to state and federal laws and regulations governing confidentiality of health care and proprietary information.
- (8) The task force shall meet as necessary and include its findings in the annual report, and the commissioner shall include the information in the annual presentation before the house and senate finance committees.
- (h) To establish and convene a workgroup representing health-care providers and health insurers for the purpose of coordinating the development of processes, guidelines, and standards to streamline health-care administration that are to be adopted by payors and providers of health-care services operating in the state. This workgroup shall include representatives with expertise who would contribute to the streamlining of health-care administration and who are selected from hospitals, physician practices, community behavioral-health organizations, each health insurer, and other affected entities. The workgroup shall also include at least one designee each from the

1	Rhode Island Medical Society, Rhode Island Council of Community Mental Health
2	Organizations, the Rhode Island Health Center Association, and the Hospital Association of
3	Rhode Island. The workgroup shall consider and make recommendations for:
4	(1) Establishing a consistent standard for electronic eligibility and coverage verification.
5	Such standard shall:
6	(i) Include standards for eligibility inquiry and response and, wherever possible, be
7	consistent with the standards adopted by nationally recognized organizations, such as the Centers
8	for Medicare and Medicaid Services;
9	(ii) Enable providers and payors to exchange eligibility requests and responses on a
0	system-to-system basis or using a payor-supported web browser;
1	(iii) Provide reasonably detailed information on a consumer's eligibility for health-care
2	coverage; scope of benefits; limitations and exclusions provided under that coverage; cost-sharing
.3	requirements for specific services at the specific time of the inquiry; current deductible amounts
4	accumulated or limited benefits; out-of-pocket maximums; any maximum policy amounts; and
.5	other information required for the provider to collect the patient's portion of the bill;
6	(iv) Reflect the necessary limitations imposed on payors by the originator of the
7	eligibility and benefits information;
.8	(v) Recommend a standard or common process to protect all providers from the costs of
9	services to patients who are ineligible for insurance coverage in circumstances where a payor
20	provides eligibility verification based on best information available to the payor at the date of the
21	request of eligibility.
22	(2) Developing implementation guidelines and promoting adoption of the guidelines for:
23	(i) The use of the National Correct Coding Initiative code-edit policy by payors and
24	providers in the state;
2.5	(ii) Publishing any variations from codes and mutually exclusive codes by payors in a
26	manner that makes for simple retrieval and implementation by providers;
27	(iii) Use of Health Insurance Portability and Accountability Act standard group codes,
28	reason codes, and remark codes by payors in electronic remittances sent to providers;
29	(iv) The processing of corrections to claims by providers and payors.
80	(v) A standard payor-denial review process for providers when they request a
81	reconsideration of a denial of a claim that results from differences in clinical edits where no
32	single, common-standards body or process exists and multiple conflicting sources are in use by
3	payors and providers.

(vi) Nothing in this section, nor in the guidelines developed, shall inhibit an individual

payor's ability to employ, and not disclose to providers, temporary code edits for the purpose of detecting and deterring fraudulent billing activities. The guidelines shall require that each payor disclose to the provider its adjudication decision on a claim that was denied or adjusted based on the application of such edits and that the provider have access to the payor's review and appeal process to challenge the payor's adjudication decision.

- (vii) Nothing in this subsection shall be construed to modify the rights or obligations of payors or providers with respect to procedures relating to the investigation, reporting, appeal, or prosecution under applicable law of potentially fraudulent billing activities.
- (3) Developing and promoting widespread adoption by payors and providers of guidelines to:
 - (i) Ensure payors do not automatically deny claims for services when extenuating circumstances make it impossible for the provider to obtain a preauthorization before services are performed or notify a payor within an appropriate standardized timeline of a patient's admission;
 - (ii) Require payors to use common and consistent processes and time frames when responding to provider requests for medical management approvals. Whenever possible, such time frames shall be consistent with those established by leading national organizations and be based upon the acuity of the patient's need for care or treatment. For the purposes of this section, medical management includes prior authorization of services, preauthorization of services, precertification of services, post-service review, medical-necessity review, and benefits advisory;
 - (iii) Develop, maintain, and promote widespread adoption of a single, common website where providers can obtain payors' preauthorization, benefits advisory, and preadmission requirements;
 - (iv) Establish guidelines for payors to develop and maintain a website that providers can use to request a preauthorization, including a prospective clinical necessity review; receive an authorization number; and transmit an admission notification.
 - (4) To provide a report to the house and senate, on or before January 1, 2017, with recommendations for establishing guidelines and regulations for systems that give patients electronic access to their claims information, particularly to information regarding their obligations to pay for received medical services, pursuant to 45 C.F.R. 164.524.
- (i) To issue an anti-cancer medication report. Not later than June 30, 2014 and annually thereafter, the office of the health insurance commissioner (OHIC) shall provide the senate committee on health and human services, and the house committee on corporations, with: (1) Information on the availability in the commercial market of coverage for anti-cancer medication options; (2) For the state employee's health benefit plan, the costs of various cancer-treatment
