## FLOOR AMENDMENT TO 2009 -- H 5983 SUBSTITUTE A

AN ACT MAKING APPROPRIATIONS FOR THE SUPPORT OF THE STATE FOR THE FISCAL YEAR ENDING JUNE 30, 2010

Mr. Speaker:

I hereby move to amend 2009 -- H 5983 SUBSTITUTE A, entitled "AN ACT MAKING APPROPRIATIONS FOR THE SUPPORT OF THE STATE FOR THE FISCAL YEAR ENDING JUNE 30, 2010", as follows:

(1) By deleting Article 1 in its entirety and inserting in place thereof the following language:

## "ARTICLE 1 RELATING TO MAKING APPROPRIATIONS IN SUPPORT OF FY 2010

SECTION 1. Subject to the conditions, limitations and restrictions hereinafter contained in this act, the following general revenue amounts are hereby appropriated out of any money in the treasury not otherwise appropriated to be expended during the fiscal year ending June 30, 2010. The amounts identified for federal funds and restricted receipts shall be made available pursuant to section 35-4-22 and Chapter 41 of Title 42 of the Rhode Island General Laws. For the purposes and functions hereinafter mentioned, the state controller is hereby authorized and directed to draw his or her orders upon the general treasurer for the payment of such sums or such portions thereof as may be required from time to time upon receipt by him or her of properly authenticated vouchers.

Sixty percent (60%) of the first \$1,000,000 appropriated funds shall be distributed to each airport serving more than 1,000,000 passengers based upon its percentage of the total passengers served by all airports serving more than 1,000,000 passengers. Forty percent (40%) of the first \$1,000,000 shall be distributed to North Central Airport, Newport-Middletown Airport, Block Island Airport, Quonset Airport, TF Green Airport, and Westerly Airport based on the share of landings during the calendar year 2006, respectively. No airport shall receive less than \$25,000. Each airport receiving any portion of the amount appropriated shall make an impact payment to the towns or cities in which the airport is located in the full amounts received from the Corporation within thirty (30) days of the payment from the Corporation.

Each community upon which any parts of the above airports are located shall receive at least \$25,000.

Such contingency funds may also be used for expenditures in departments and agencies where appropriations are insufficient, or where such requirements are due to unforeseen conditions or are non-recurring items of an unusual nature. Said appropriation may also be used for the payment of bills incurred due to emergencies or to any offense against public peace and property, in accordance with the provisions of Titles 11 and 45 of the General Laws of 1956, as amended. All expenditures and transfers from this account shall be approved by the Governor.

SECTION 2. Each line appearing in Section 1 of this Article shall constitute an appropriation.

SECTION 3. Upon the transfer of any function of a department or agency to another department or agency, the Governor is hereby authorized by means of executive order to transfer or reallocate, in whole or in part, the appropriations and the full-time equivalent limits affected thereby.

SECTION 4. Notwithstanding any provisions of Chapter 38 in Title 45 of the Rhode Island General Laws, the Rhode Island Health and Educational Building Corporation shall transfer to the State Controller the sum of one million dollars (\$1,000,000) on June 30, 2010.

SECTION 5. Extension of previous authorizations. -- The general assembly, pursuant to the provisions of section 35-8-25 of the general laws, hereby extends to the termination date contained herein the authority to issue the following general obligation bond authorization in the amount stated. The original authorization enacted by public law and approved by the people that remains unissued as of March 1, 2009 is as follows:

SECTION 6. The general assembly authorizes the state controller to establish the internal service accounts shown below, and no other, to finance and account for the operations of state agencies that provide services to other agencies, institutions and other governmental units on a cost reimbursed basis. The purpose of these accounts is to ensure that certain activities are managed in a businesslike manner, promote efficient use of services by making agencies pay the full costs associated with providing the services, and allocate the costs of central administrative services across all fund types, so that federal and other non-general fund programs share in the costs of general government support. The controller is authorized to reimburse these accounts for the cost of work or services performed for any other department or agency subject to the following expenditure limitations:

SECTION 7. The General Assembly may provide a written "statement of legislative

intent" signed by the chairperson of the House Finance Committee and by the chairperson of the Senate Finance Committee to show the intended purpose of the appropriations contained in Section 1 of this Article. The statement of legislative intent shall be kept on file in the House Finance Committee and in the Senate Finance Committee.

At least twenty (20) days prior to the issuance of a grant or the release of funds, which grant or funds are listed on the legislative letter of intent, all department, agency and corporation directors, shall notify in writing the chairperson of the House Finance Committee and the chairperson of the Senate Finance Committee of the approximate date when the funds are to be released or granted.

SECTION 8. Appropriation of Temporary Disability Insurance Funds -- There is hereby appropriated pursuant to sections 28-39-5 and 28-39-8 of the Rhode Island General Laws all funds required to be disbursed for the benefit payments from the Temporary Disability Insurance Fund and Temporary Disability Insurance Reserve Fund for the fiscal year ending June 30, 2010.

SECTION 9. Appropriation of Employment Security Funds -- There is hereby appropriated pursuant to section 28-42-19 of the Rhode Island General Laws all funds required to be disbursed for benefit payments from the Employment Security Fund for the fiscal year ending June 30, 2010.

SECTION 10. Appropriation of Lottery Division Funds – There is hereby appropriated to the Lottery Division any funds required to be disbursed by the Lottery Division for the purposes of paying commissions or transfers to the prize fund for the fiscal year ending June 30, 2010.

SECTION 11. Departments and agencies listed below may not exceed the number of full-time equivalent (FTE) positions shown below in any pay period. Full-time equivalent positions do not include seasonal or intermittent positions whose scheduled period of employment does not exceed twenty-six consecutive weeks or whose scheduled hours do not exceed nine hundred and twenty-five (925) hours, excluding overtime, in a one-year period. Nor do they include individuals engaged in training, the completion of which is a prerequisite of employment. Provided, however, that the Governor or designee, Speaker of the House of Representatives or designee, and the President of the Senate or designee may authorize an adjustment to any limitation. Prior to the authorization, the State Budget Officer shall make a detailed written recommendation to the Governor, the Speaker of the House, and the President of the Senate. A copy of the recommendation and authorization to adjust shall be transmitted to the chairman of the House Finance Committee, Senate Finance Committee, the House Fiscal Advisor and the Senate Fiscal Advisor.

No agency or department may employ contracted employees or employee services where the contracted employees would work under state employee supervisors without determination of need by the Director of Administration acting upon the positive recommendations of the Budget Officer and the Personnel Administrator and 15 days after a public hearing.

Nor may any agency or department contract for services replacing work done by state employees at that time without determination of need by the Director of Administration acting upon the positive recommendations of the Budget Officer and the Personnel Administrator and 30 days after a public hearing.

State employees whose funding is from non-state general revenue funds that are time limited shall receive limited term appointment with the term limited to the availability of the non-state general revenue funding source.

SECTION 13. Reappropriation of Funding for Rhode Island Capital Plan Fund Projects. - Any unexpended and unencumbered funds from Rhode Island Capital Plan Fund project appropriations shall be reappropriated in the ensuing fiscal year and made available for the same purpose. Any unexpended funds of less than five hundred dollars (\$500) shall be reappropriated at the discretion of the State Budget Officer.

SECTION 14. There is hereby appropriated \$22,000,000 from the Budget Reserve and Cash Stabilization Account for FY 2009.

## FLOOR AMENDMENT TO 2009 -- H 5983 SUBSTITUTE A

AN ACT MAKING APPROPRIATIONS FOR THE SUPPORT OF THE STATE FOR THE FISCAL YEAR ENDING JUNE 30, 2010

Mr. Speaker:

I hereby move to amend 2009 -- H 5983 SUBSTITUTE A, entitled "AN ACT MAKING APPROPRIATIONS FOR THE SUPPORT OF THE STATE FOR THE FISCAL YEAR ENDING JUNE 30, 2010", as follows:

In Article 3, by deleting Article 3 in its entirety, and inserting in place thereof the following language:

## "ARTICLE 3

#### RELATING TO EDUCATION AID

SECTION 1. Sections 16-7.1-10 and 16-7.1-15 of the General Laws in Chapter 16-7.1 entitled "The Paul W. Crowley Rhode Island Student Investment Initiative" are hereby amended to read as follows:

16-7.1-10. Professional development investment fund. — (a) In order to continue developing the skills of Rhode Island's teachers, administrators and staff, the general assembly establishes a Professional Development Investment Fund. The general assembly shall annually appropriate some sum and distribute it based on a pupil-teacher ratio that shall be adjusted annually by the commissioner of elementary and secondary education. School districts, including collaboratives established pursuant to chapter 3.1 of this title, may use funds received under this category of education aid to replace up to, but no more than, fifty percent (50%) of the amount the school district spent for professional development programs in the previous fiscal year. The expenditure of these funds shall be determined by a committee at each school consisting of the school principal, two (2) teachers selected by the teaching staff of the school, and two (2) parents of students attending the school. Schools that enroll students in the early grades (kindergarten through grade three (3)) must expend these funds on the development of scientific research based, as described in the No Child Left Behind Act of 2001, Title 1, Part B, Section 1208 [20 U.S.C. section 6368], reading instruction to improve students reading performance.

Schools that have met their performance targets in reading for the current academic year and are not designated as a school in need of improvement, may expend their Professional Development Investment Funds on professional development in the core academic subjects of mathematics, writing, or reading to improve student performance.

Collaborative programs between schools are encouraged. These resources shall be used to close student performance gaps in accordance with the school's and district's strategic plan pursuant to section 16-7.1-2. Additional funds shall be allocated to the department of elementary and secondary education to support teacher and administrator professional development in all districts, including, but not limited to:

- (1) Supporting mentoring systems;
- (2) Providing school districts with program support to assist teachers in local school districts to improve reading instruction and enhance the integration of reading throughout the curriculum with the goal of improving student performance to high standards;
- (3) Support for the design and implementation of leadership development for the teacher to assume leadership roles or ultimately prepare for administrator;
- (4) Development of a plan for formal training of school leaders in standards based instruction, school improvement planning, effective use of data in the decision-making process, community involvement and creation of governance structures;
- (5) Support for national board certification of teachers, application fees for a certificate of clinical competence issued by the American speech-language hearing association, and grants

for coordination and support of school based teacher professional development; and

- (6) The practice of scientific research based reading instruction to improve reading performance.
- (b) In FY 2003, the additional funds allocated to the department of elementary and secondary education pursuant to this section shall be used only to support the activities described in subdivisions (a)(2) and (a)(5) of this section.
- (c) Out of the funds appropriated by the general assembly for professional development in subsection (a) of this section, twenty-five percent (25%) shall be set aside for district-wide professional development activities. The expenditure of this district-wide professional development set-aside shall be determined by a committee in each district consisting of the superintendent or his or her designee, three (3) teachers appointed by the collective bargaining agent, and one member of the Rhode Island department of elementary and secondary education field service team servicing that school district designated by the commissioner of elementary and secondary education. The expenditure must be aligned with the district strategic plan as well as ongoing professional development programs approved by the department of elementary and secondary education. Collaborative programs between school districts are permissible.
- (d) Beginning in FY 2006, professional development funds shall only be spent with the prior approval of the commissioner of elementary and secondary education upon submission of a district level plan which incorporates the school level plans and which details the use of the funds. These plans shall to the extent possible call for professional development activities that are embedded or do not otherwise encroach upon student instruction time. The requirements of this paragraph shall apply to both district-wide professional development activities and professional development activities determined by the school-level committees.
- (e) In FY 2009 payments from the professional development investment fund are hereby suspended through June 30, 2009. Notwithstanding, school districts may continue to maintain professional development programs and may reduce other education programs to achieve savings.
- (f) In FY 2010 payments from the professional development investment fund are hereby suspended through June 30, 2010. Notwithstanding, school districts may continue to maintain professional development programs and may reduce other education programs to achieve savings.
- 16-7.1-15. The Paul W. Crowley Rhode Island student investment initiative. -- (a) Each locally or regionally operated school district shall receive as a base the same amount of school aid as each district received in fiscal year 1997-1998, adjusted to reflect the increases or decreases in aid enacted to meet the minimum and maximum funding levels established for FY 2000 through FY 2008. Each school district shall also receive school aid through each investment fund for which that district qualifies pursuant to sections 16-7.1-8, 16-7.1-9, 16-7.1-10, 16-7.1-11, 16-7.1-12, 16-7.1-16 and 16-7.1-19. These sums shall be in addition to the base amount described in this section. For FY 2009 and FY 2010, the reference year for the data used in the calculation of aid pursuant to section 16-7.1-8, section 16-7.1-9, section 16-7.1-10, section 16-7.1-11, section 16-7.1-11.1, section 16-7.1-12, section 16-7.1-16, section 16-7.1-19 and 16-7.1-2(b) shall be FY 2004. Calculation and distribution of education aid under sections 16-5-31, 16-5-32, 16-7-20, 16-7-20.5, 16-7-34.2, 16-7-34.3, 16-24-6, 16-54-4, and 16-67-4 is hereby suspended. Provided, however, calculation and distribution of education aid under §16-7.1-10 is suspended for FY 2009 and FY 2010. School districts may continue to maintain professional development programs and may reduce other education programs to achieve savings during FY

2009 and FY 2010. The funding of the purposes and activities of chapter 67 of this title, the Rhode Island Literacy and Dropout Prevention Act of 1967, shall be the same amount of the base amount of each district funded for that purpose in fiscal year 1997-1998. In addition each district shall expend three percent (3%) of its student equity and early childhood funds under the provisions of chapter 67 of this title.

- (b) Funding for full day kindergarten programs in accordance with section 16-7.1-11.1 shall be in addition to funding received under this section.
- (c) Funding distributed under sections 16-77.1-2(b) and 16-64-1.1 shall be in addition to funding distributed under this section.
- (d) For FY 2009, aid to school districts shall be reduced by the equivalent savings that are realized due to a reduction of payments to the teachers' retirement system. The reduction for the Chariho regional school district shall be prorated among the member communities. In addition, for FY 2009 aid to school districts shall be reduced by any amount of previously appropriated school housing aid determined to be ineligible for reimbursement in accordance with section 16-7-44.2. For FY 2009 aid shall also be reduced by the amount of projected revenue for the period December 1, 2008 through June 30, 2009 from the permanent school fund. The projected revenue shall be determined by annualizing actual earnings from the period May 12, 2008 through November 30, 2008. The department of elementary and secondary education shall reduce aid in two equal installments, payable in May and June; provided however, that East Providence shall receive one payment of reduced aid in May.

For FY 2009, aid to school districts shall include thirty eight million, three hundred twenty-four thousand, eight hundred twenty-two dollars (\$38,324,822) from federal fiscal stabilization funds offset by a like reduction from general revenues. The distribution shall be in the same proportion as general operating aid.

(e) For FY 2010, aid to school districts shall be reduced by the equivalent savings that are realized due to a reduction of payments to the teachers' retirement system. The reduction for the Chariho regional school district shall be prorated among the member communities. For FY 2010, aid to school districts shall be reduced by thirty-three million nine hundred twenty-eight thousand two hundred sixteen dollars (\$33,928,216) based on the school district's share of total FY 2009 enacted education aid, including state schools and charter schools. For FY 2010, a distribution of stabilization funds per the American Recovery and Reinvestment Act (ARRA) totaling thirty-four million one hundred seven thousand one hundred ninety-five dollars (\$34,107,195) shall be allocated to school districts proportionately based on their share of total FY 2009 enacted education aid, including state schools and charter schools. Districts shall comply with the assurances and reporting requirements provided in the federal guidance for the (ARRA) allocation and by the commissioner of elementary and secondary education.

(e)(f) There shall be an appropriation to ensure that total aid distributed to communities in FY  $\frac{2009}{2010}$  under this section and sections 16-7.1-11.1, 16-64-1.1 and 16-77.1-2(b) shall be as follows:

In addition to the amounts listed above, the department of elementary and secondary education shall allocate monthly to each school district all funds received into the permanent school fund pursuant to section 42-61.2-7, as amended by chapter 13 of the 2008 Public Laws entitled "An Act Relating to State Affairs and Government", up to \$14.1 million, in the same proportion as the aid distribution in the FY 2009 enacted appropriations act.

This special provision shall not limit entitlements as determined by application of other formula provisions in this section.

(f)(g) For FY 2009 payments to charter public schools shall be reduced by the equivalent savings that are realized due to a reduction of payments to the teachers' retirement system. The reduction for district sponsored charter schools shall be incorporated in the sponsoring school district's aid as noted in subsection (e)(f). Aid to charter public schools shall be reduced in the April quarterly payment. For FY 2009, charter public school funding is as follows:

(h) For FY 2010, payments to charter public schools shall be reduced by the equivalent savings that are realized due to a deferment of payments to the teachers' retirement system. The reduction for district sponsored charter schools shall be incorporated in the sponsoring schools district's aid as noted in subsection (f). For FY 2010, payments to charter public schools shall be reduced by one million four hundred sixty-three thousand three hundred sixty seven dollars (\$1,463,367) based on the charter schools' share of total FY 2009 enacted education aid, including school districts and state schools. For FY 2010, a distribution of stabilization funds per the American Recovery and Reinvestment Act (ARRA) totaling one million four hundred seventy-one thousand eighty seven dollars (\$1,471,087) shall be allocated to charter public schools proportionately based on their share of total FY 2009 enacted education aid, including school districts and state schools. Public charter schools shall comply with the assurances and reporting requirements provided in the federal guidance for the (ARRA) allocation and by the commissioner of elementary and secondary education.

(g)(i) Children with disabilities. (1) Based on its review of special education within the context of Rhode Island school reform, the general assembly recommends addressing the needs of all children and preventing disability through scientific research based, as described in the No Child Left Behind Act of 2001, Title 1, Part B, Section 1208 [20 U.S.C. § 6368], reading instruction and the development of Personal Literacy Programs for students in the early grades performing below grade level in reading and implement a system of student accountability that will enable the state to track individual students over time. Additionally, the department of elementary and secondary education must provide districts with rigorous criteria and procedures for identifying students with learning disabilities and speech/language impairments. Additional study is required of factors that influence programming for students with low incidence disabilities; those with disabilities that severely compromise life functions; and programming for students with disabilities through urban special education. Alternatives for funding special education require examination.

(2) All departments and agencies of the state shall furnish any advice and information, documentary and otherwise, to the general assembly and its agents that is deemed necessary or desirable by the study to facilitate the purposes of this section.

SECTION 2. This article shall take effect on July 1, 2009."

- (4) The regionalization bonus fund percentage identified above shall be proportionately distributed to all of the non-regionalized school districts.
- (i) No school district experiencing a total decrease in resident average daily number greater than twelve percent (12%) for the fiscal year 1999 through 2009 shall receive any of these redirected regionalization bonus funds.
- (ii) No school district reporting a budget surplus greater than five percent (5%) in any two (2) fiscal year between 2005 and 2009 shall receive any of the redirected regionalization bonus funds.
- (iii) Any school district experiencing an increase in enrollment greater than five percent (5%) in the resident average daily membership shall receive additional aid from the redirected regionalization bonus funds in proportion to their increase in enrollment."

- 1. In Article 5, on page 6, line 5, by deleting the date "December 1, 2009" and inserting in place thereof the date "January 1, 2011".
- 2. In Article 5, on pages 21 through 26, by deleting the language on line 34 on page 21, by deleting lines 1 through 34 on page 22 on page 22, by deleting lines 1 through 34 on page 23, by deleting lines 1 through 34 on page 24, by deleting lines 1 through 34 on page 25, and by deleting lines 1 through 26 on page 26 and by inserting in place thereof the following language:

"SECTION 13. Section 42-14.5-3 of the General Laws in Chapter 42-14.5 entitled "The Rhode Island Health Care Reform Act of 2004 - Health Insurance Oversight" is hereby amended to read as follows:

- 42-14.5-3. Powers and duties. [Contingent effective date; see notes under section 42-14.5-1.] -- The health insurance commissioner shall have the following powers and duties:
- (a) To conduct an annual quarterly public meeting or meetings throughout the state, separate and distinct from rate hearings pursuant to section 42-62-13, regarding the rates, services and operations of insurers licensed to provide health insurance in the state the effects of such rates, services and operations on consumers, medical care providers, and patients, and the market environment in which such insurers operate and efforts to bring new health insurers into the Rhode Island market. Notice of not less than ten (10) days of said hearing(s) shall go to the general assembly, the governor, the Rhode Island Medical Society, the Hospital Association of Rhode Island, the director of health, and the attorney general and the chambers of commerce. Public notice shall be posted on the department's web site and given in the newspaper of general circulation, and to any entity in writing requesting notice.
- (b) To make recommendations to the governor and the joint legislative committee on health care oversight house of representatives and senate finance committees regarding health care insurance and the regulations, rates, services, administrative expenses, reserve requirements, and operations of insurers providing health insurance in the state, and to prepare or comment on, upon the request of the co-chairs of the joint committee on health care oversight or upon the request of the governor, or chairpersons of the house or senate finance committees, draft legislation to improve the regulation of health insurance. In making such recommendations, the commissioner shall recognize that it is the intent of the legislature that the maximum disclosure be provided regarding the reasonableness of individual administrative expenditures as well as total administrative costs. The commissioner shall also make recommendations on the levels of reserves including consideration of: targeted reserve levels; trends in the increase or decrease of reserve levels; and insurer plans for distributing excess reserves.
- (c) To establish a consumer/business/labor/medical advisory council to obtain information and present concerns of consumers, business and medical providers affected by

health insurance decisions. The council shall develop proposals to allow the market for small business health insurance to be affordable and fairer. The council shall be involved in the planning and conduct of the quarterly public meeting meetings in accordance with subsection (a) above. The advisory council shall assist in the design develop measures to inform small businesses of an insurance complaint process to ensure that small businesses that experience extraordinary rate increases in a given year could may request and receive a formal review by the department. The advisory council shall assess views of the health provider community relative to insurance rates of reimbursement, billing and reimbursement procedures, and the insurers' role in promoting efficient and high quality health care. The advisory council shall issue an annual report of findings and recommendations to the governor and the joint legislative committee on health care oversight general assembly and present their findings at hearings before the house and senate finance committees. The advisory council is to be diverse in interests and shall include representatives of community consumer organizations; small businesses, other than those involved in the sale of insurance products; and hospital, medical, and other health provider organizations. Such representatives shall be nominated by their respective organizations. The advisory council shall be co-chaired by the health insurance commissioner and a community consumer organization or small business member to be elected by the full advisory council.

- (d) To establish and provide guidance and assistance to a subcommittee ("The Professional Provider-Health Plan Work Group") of the advisory council created pursuant to subsection (c) above, composed of health care providers and Rhode Island licensed health plans. This subcommittee shall develop a plan to implement the following activities include in its annual report and presentation before the house and senate finance committees the following information:
- (i) By January 1, 2006, a  $\underline{A}$  method whereby health plans shall disclose to contracted providers the fee schedules used to provide payment to those providers for services rendered to covered patients;
- (ii) By April 1, 2006, a A standardized provider application and credentials verification process, for the purpose of verifying professional qualifications of participating health care providers;
- (iii) By September 1, 2006, a <u>The</u> uniform health plan claim form to be utilized by participating providers;
- (iv) By March 15, 2007, a report to the legislature on proposed methods Methods for health maintenance organizations as defined by section 27-41-1, and nonprofit hospital or medical service corporations as defined by chapters 27-19 and 27-20, to make facility-specific data and other medical service-specific data available in reasonably consistent formats to patients regarding quality and costs. This information would help consumers make informed choices regarding the facilities and/or clinicians or physician practices at which to seek care. Among the items considered would be the unique health services and other public goods provided by facilities and/or clinicians or physician practices in establishing the most appropriate cost comparisons.
- (v) By December 1, 2006, All activities related to contractual disclosure to participating providers of the mechanisms for resolving health plan/provider disputes; and
- (vi) By February 1, 2007, a The uniform process being utilized for confirming in real time patient insurance enrollment status, benefits coverage, including co-pays and deductibles.
- (vii) By December 1, 2007, a report to the legislature on the temporary <u>Information</u> related to temporary credentialing of providers seeking to participate in the plan's network and

the impact of said activity on health plan accreditation;

- (viii) By February 1, 2008, a report to the legislature on the <u>The</u> feasibility of occasional regular contract renegotiations between plans and the providers in their networks.
- (ix) By May 1, 2008, a report to the legislature Efforts conducted related to reviewing impact of silent PPOs on physician practices.

A report on the work of the subcommittee shall be submitted by the health insurance commissioner to the joint legislative committee on health care oversight on March 1, 2006, March 1, 2007, and March 1, 2008.

- (e) To enforce the provisions of Title 27 and Title 42 as set forth in section 42-14-5(d).
- (f) There is hereby established <u>To provide analysis of</u> the Rhode Island Affordable Health Plan Reinsurance Fund. The fund shall be used to effectuate the provisions of sections 27-18.5-8 and 27-50-17.
- (g) To examine and study analyze the impact of changing the rating guidelines and/or merging the individual health insurance market as defined in chapter 27-18.5 and the small employer health insurance market as defined in chapter 27-50 in accordance with the following:
- (i) The study <u>analysis</u> shall forecast the likely rate increases required to effect the changes recommended pursuant to the preceding subsection (g) in the direct pay market and small employer health insurance market over the next five (5) years, based on the current rating structure, and current products.
- (ii) The study <u>analysis</u> shall include examining the impact of merging the individual and small employer markets on premiums charged to individuals and small employer groups.
- (iii) The study <u>analysis</u> shall include examining the impact on rates in each of the individual and small employer health insurance markets and the number of insureds in the context of possible changes to the rating guidelines used for small employer groups, including: community rating principles; expanding small employer rate bonds beyond the current range; increasing the employer group size in the small group market; and/or adding rating factors for broker and/or tobacco use.
- (iv) The study <u>analysis</u> shall include examining the adequacy of current statutory and regulatory oversight of the rating process and factors employed by the participants in the proposed new merged market.
- (v) The study <u>analysis</u> shall include assessment of possible reinsurance mechanisms and/or federal high-risk pool structures and funding to support the health insurance market in Rhode Island by reducing the risk of adverse selection and the incremental insurance premiums charged for this risk, and/or by making health insurance affordable for a selected at-risk population.
- (vi) The health insurance commissioner shall establish work with an insurance market merger task force to assist with the study analysis. The task force shall be chaired by the health insurance commissioner and shall include, but not be limited to, representatives of the general assembly, the business community, small employer carriers as defined in section 27-50-3, carriers offering coverage in the individual market in Rhode Island, health insurance brokers and members of the general public.
- (vii) For the purposes of conducting this study <u>analysis</u>, the commissioner may contract with an outside organization with expertise in fiscal analysis of the private insurance market. In conducting its study, the organization shall, to the extent possible, obtain and use actual health plan data. Said data shall be subject to state and federal laws and regulations governing confidentiality of health care and proprietary information.

- (viii) The task force shall meet no later than October 1, 2007 and the commissioner shall file a report with the speaker of the house of representatives and the president of the senate no later than January 1, 2008 as necessary and include their findings in the annual report and the commissioner shall include the information in the annual presentation before the house and senate finance committees."
- 3. In Article 5, on page 26 through 27, by deleting in their entirety lines 27 through 34 on page 26 and by deleting in their entirety lines 1 through 15 on page 27.

Alternative flat tax rate. -- (a) For tax years beginning on or after January 1, 2006, a taxpayer may elect to compute his or her Rhode Island personal income tax liability as provided in this section. If no election is made, the taxpayer's personal income tax liability shall be computed as otherwise provided in this chapter.
- (b) For purposes of this section, "alternative Rhode Island taxable income" shall mean federal adjusted gross income as determined for federal income tax purposes as modified by sections 44-30-12 and 44-30-32 for residents and nonresidents, respectively. No other state or federal deductions or adjustments to income shall be available to the taxpayer.
- (c) For purposes of this section, the "alternative tax rate" shall be eight percent (8.0%) for the tax year 2006; seven and one-half percent (7.5%) for tax year 2007; and seven percent (7%) for tax year 2008; six and one-half percent (6.5%) for tax year 2009; six percent (6%) for tax year 2010; and five and one-half percent (5.5%) for tax years 2011 and thereafter;
- (d) The alternative personal income tax shall be determined by multiplying the taxpayer's alternative Rhode Island taxable income by the alternative tax rate, less the following credits:

- (1) Credit for income taxes paid to other states as provided for in section 44-30-18;
- (2) Credit for Rhode Island personal income tax withheld as provided in section 44-30-74;
- (3) Credit for Rhode Island payments of estimated tax as provided in section 44-30-56(e) and RI Reg. Sec. PIT 90-17;
  - (4) Credit for Rhode Island overpayment of taxes as provided in section 44-30-86(a); and
- (5) Credit for Rhode Island amount remitted by a limited liability company on behalf of a nonresident member as provided in section 7-16-73(4).

No other state or federal tax credits shall be available to the taxpayer in computing the alternative personal income tax liability.

- (e) The provisions of this section may apply regardless of the taxpayer's filing status."

WHEREAS, the State of Rhode Island and Providence Plantations (the "State") has delegated to the Rhode Island Department of Transportation (the "Department") the responsibility for preparing short-range plans, project plans, and implementation programs for transportation and for maintaining an adequate level of rail passenger and freight services, including the administration of any financial or technical assistance which may be made available to operators of railroad transportation facilities; and

WHEREAS, the Department now seeks to extend commuter rail service south from the National Railroad Passenger Corporation ("Amtrak") Providence Station in Providence, Rhode Island (the "Providence Station") with stops at the proposed Warwick Intermodal Station at T.F. Green Airport in Warwick, Rhode Island (the "Intermodal Station") and Wickford Junction in North Kingstown, Rhode Island (the "Wickford Station") (collectively, the "South County Commuter Rail Service"); and

WHEREAS, the Department intends to appoint the Massachusetts Bay Transportation Authority (the "MBTA") as the operator of the South County Commuter Rail Service (the "Designated Operator") upon execution of that certain Access Agreement (the "Access Agreement") entered into by and between the Department and the National Railroad Passenger Corporation ("Amtrak"); and

WHEREAS, Amtrak owns the right-of-way on which the South County Commuter Rail Service would operate; and

WHEREAS, Amtrak required the Department to provide certain risk-management and financial assurances and indemnification covenants and obligations as a condition precedent to the Access Agreement, that certain Assignment and Assumption Agreement entered into for the benefit of Amtrak by and between the Department and the Rhode Island Public Rail Corporation ("Rail Corp"), a public instrumentality of the Sate established by Section 42-64.2 et seq. of the General Laws of Rhode Island (the "Act"), that certain Master Force Account Agreement for improvements between Warwick and Providence entered into by and between Amtrak, the Rhode Island Airport Corporation ("RIAC"), a governmental agency of the State established by the Rhode Island Economic Development Corporation and Rail Corp, that certain Temporary Easement Agreement entered into by and between Amtrak, RIAC and Rail Corp, and that certain Permanent Easement Agreement entered into by and between Amtrak, RIAC and Rail Corp, and

that certain Master Force Account Agreement for improvements between Warwick and North Kingstown to be entered into by and between Amtrak and the Department or its designee, that certain Temporary Easement Agreement to be entered into by and between Amtrak and Rail Corp, and that certain Permanent Easement Agreement entered into by and between Amtrak and Rail Corp (collectively, the "South County Commuter Rail Service Agreements"); and

WHEREAS, the above-referenced assurances and indemnification covenants and obligations include, without limitation, the (1) The Department secure and maintain a liability insurance policy covering the liability of the State and Amtrak for property damage, personal injury, bodily injury and death arising out of the South County Commuter Rail Service, with policy limits of Two Hundred Million United States Dollars (\$200,000,000.00), naming the Department, Rail Corp, Amtrak and the MBTA as primary insureds, all subject to a self-insured retention of Seven Million Five Hundred Thousand United States Dollars (\$7,500,000.00) (the "Retention"), (2) The Department defend, indemnify and save harmless such third parties, irrespective of negligence or fault of Amtrak or such third parties, for all damage or liability for personal injury or property damage which would not have occurred or would not have been incurred but for the existence of the South County Commuter Rail Service or the presence on the Northeast Properties (as such term is defined in the Access Agreement) of any trains, passengers, employees, contractors, or invitees of the State or the State's Designated Operator (the "Amtrak Access Indemnification"), (3) Rail Corp and RIAC defend, indemnify and save harmless Amtrak and third parties to the extent that Amtrak is obligated to defend, indemnify or save harmless such third parties, irrespective of negligence or fault of Amtrak or such third parties, for all damage or liability for personal injury or property damage which would not have occurred but for the improvements undertaken pursuant to the Master Force Account Agreements, the Temporary Easements and Permanent Easements with respect to the Intermodal Station and the Wickford Station (the "Amtrak Indemnification"), and (4) The Department defend, indemnify and save harmless the MBTA for all damage or liability for personal injury or property damages which would not have occurred or would not have been incurred but for the MBTA's activities as the Designated Operator under the Access Agreement except for damages or liability attributable directly to the MBTA's own negligence or misconduct (the "MBTA Indemnification"); and

WHEREAS, the Department may be constitutionally prohibited from providing the financial assurances and the indemnification covenants and obligations and therefore has designated Rail Corp as the responsible party for providing Amtrak and MBTA with the foregoing assurances, covenants and obligations on behalf of the Department; and

WHEREAS, RIAC is unable to provide the financial assurances and the indemnification covenants and obligations and therefore has also designated Rail Corp as the responsible party for providing Amtrak with the foregoing assurances, covenants and obligations on behalf of RIAC; and

WHEREAS, Amtrak has agreed to accept Rail Corp's financial assurances and indemnification covenants and obligations on behalf of the Department and RIAC; provided, however, that Rail Corp first secure either a line or evergreen letter of credit in the amount of Seven Million Five Hundred Thousand United States Dollars (\$7,500,000.00) issued by a bank authorized to do business in Rhode Island with a surplus of not less than One Hundred Million United States Dollars (\$100,000,000.00) in favor of Amtrak to secure Rail Corp's performance of its obligations arising under any South County Commuter Rail Service Agreements, specifically the payment of any amounts arising from time to time under the Retention or any amounts that

are uninsured; and

WHEREAS, pursuant to the Act, Rail Corp is authorized, created, and established for the purpose of enhancing and preserving the viability of commuter transit and railroad freight operations in Rhode Island and has the power to make contracts and guarantees and incur liabilities, borrow money at any rates of interest that it may determine, and to make and execute any other contracts and instruments necessary or convenient in the exercise of the powers, purposes and functions of the Act; and

WHEREAS, Rail Corp, at the present time, has no source of funds to discharge the obligations it has assumed to Amtrak other than the funds appropriated to the department in the annual budget and transferred to Rail Corp; and

WHEREAS, a financial institution may not provide a line or evergreen letter of credit to Rail Corp without some assurances that funds would be appropriated to the department and transferred to Rail Corp; and

WHEREAS, pursuant to the Assignment and Assumption Agreement, the department has covenanted on behalf of the state to support Rail Corp and to include such financial support in the Governor's printed budget submitted to the general assembly each year; and

WHEREAS, the obligations undertaken by the department on behalf of the State and Rail Corp as outlined herein, and the approval and authority for Rail Corp to secure and maintain the letter or evergreen line of credit are subject to Chapter 18 of Title 35 of the Rhode Island General Laws; and

WHEREAS, pursuant to Sections 35-18-3 and 35-18-4 of the Rhode Island General Laws, Rail Corp has requested the approval and authority of the General Assembly to enter into agreements and execute documents reasonably necessary from time to time to secure and maintain the above-referenced line or evergreen letter of credit to support payment obligations of the Retention, for the payment of any costs and fees reasonably incurred in connection with securing and maintaining such line or evergreen letter of credit, and for the extension of both the risk-management and financial assurances, Amtrak Access Indemnification and Amtrak Indemnification and the risk-management and financial assurances, and MBTA Indemnification; now, therefore be it

RESOLVED, that the General Assembly hereby approves and authorizes Rail Corp to secure and maintain, and hereby approves and authorizes the department's support of Rail Corp and the use by Rail Corp of the department's funding as covenanted in the Assignment and Assumption Agreement to secure and maintain a line or evergreen letter of credit in the amount of Seven Million Five Hundred Thousand United States Dollars (\$7,500,000.00) issued by a bank authorized to do business in Rhode Island with a surplus of not less than One Hundred Million United States Dollars (\$100,000,000.00) in favor of Amtrak to secure Rail Corp's performance of its obligations arising under any South County Commuter Rail Service Agreements, specifically the payment of any amounts arising from time to time under the Retention, and for the payment of any costs and fees reasonably incurred in connection with securing and maintaining such line or evergreen letter of credit; and be it further

RESOLVED, that the per passenger cost of the extended commuter rail service shall not be subsidized with any state funds."

- (1) Determine the percent of the state's total Medicaid outpatient and emergency department services (exclusive of physician services) provided by each hospital during the hospital's fiscal year ending during 2008;
- (2) Determine the sum of all Medicaid payments to hospitals made for outpatient and emergency department services (exclusive of physician services) provided during each hospital's fiscal year ending during 2008;
- (3) Multiply the sum of all Medicaid payments as determined in subdivision (2) by seventy-seven and forty-one hundredths percent (77.41%) and then multiply that result by each hospital's percentage of the state's total Medicaid outpatient and emergency department services as determined in subdivision (1) to obtain the total outpatient adjustment for each hospital to be paid in SFY 2010;
- (4) Pay each hospital on or about July 20, 2009, October 20, 2009, January 20, 2010, and April 20, 2010 one-quarter (.25) of its total outpatient adjustment as determined in subdivision (3) above.
- (b) The amounts determined in subsection (a) are in addition to Medicaid outpatient payments and emergency services payments (exclusive of physician services) paid to hospitals in accordance with current state regulation and the Rhode Island Plan for Medicaid Assistance pursuant to Title XIX of the Social Security Act and are not subject to recoupment or settlement."

AN ACT MAKING APPROPRIATIONS FOR THE SUPPORT OF THE STATE FOR THE FISCAL YEAR ENDING JUNE 30, 2010

Mr. Speaker:

I hereby move to amend 2009 -- H 5983 SUBSTITUTE A, entitled "AN ACT MAKING APPROPRIATIONS FOR THE SUPPORT OF THE STATE FOR THE FISCAL YEAR ENDING JUNE 30, 2010", as follows:

- (1) In Article 23, page 3, by deleting all the language on lines 12 through 23 and inserting in place thereof the following language:
- "SECTION 2. Section 40-8-29 of the General Laws in Chapter 40-8 entitled "Medical Assistance" is hereby amended to read as follows:
- 40-8-29. Selective contracting. -- (a) Notwithstanding any other provision of state law, the department of human services is authorized to utilize selective contracting with prior general assembly approval for the purpose of purchasing for Medicaid recipients shared living provider services, durable medical equipment and supplies, and any other Medicaid services, when appropriate, in order to assure that all service expenditures under this chapter have the maximum benefit of competition, and afford Rhode Islanders the overall best value, optimal quality, and the most cost-effective care possible. Beneficiaries will be limited to using the services/products of only those providers determined in a competitive bidding process to meet the standards for best quality, performance and price set by the department in accordance with applicable federal and state laws.
- (b) Any approved medical assistance provider who declines to participate in contracting for benefits in any one of the department's medical assistance programs, including, but not limited to any and all managed care programs, may be suspended as a participating provider and denied participation in all state operated medical assistance programs at the discretion of the department.
- (b) For purposes of this section "selective contracting" shall mean the process for choosing providers to serve Medicaid beneficiaries based on their ability to deliver the best quality products or services, at the best value or price.
- (c) To ensure all services allowable for Medicare reimbursement for beneficiaries who are dually eligible, selective contractors must be willing and able to accept Medicare."
- (2) In Article 23, page 5, line 26, by the deleting the language "one hundred thirty-three percent".
- (3) In Article 23, page 5, line 27, by deleting the number "(133%)" and inserting in place thereof the language "one hundred fifty percent (150%)".

- (10) In Article 23, page 19, by deleting all of the language on lines 1 through 6 and inserting in place thereof the following language:

"SECTION 10. Section 40-8.9-9 of the General Laws in Chapter 40-8.9 entitled "Medical Assistance - Long-Term Care Service and Finance Reform" is hereby amended to read as follows:

- 40-8.9-9. Long-term care re-balancing system reform goal. -- (a) Notwithstanding any other provision of state law, the department of human services is authorized and directed to apply for and obtain any necessary waiver(s), waiver amendment(s) and/or state plan amendments from the secretary of the United States department of health and human services, and to promulgate rules necessary to adopt an affirmative plan of program design and implementation that addresses the goal of allocating a minimum of fifty percent (50%) of Medicaid long-term care funding for persons aged sixty-five (65) and over and adults with disabilities in addition to services for persons with developmental disabilities and mental disabilities to home and community-based care on or before December 31, 2012 2013; provided, further, the executive office of health and human services shall report annually as part of its budget submission, the percentage distribution between institutional care and home and community-based care by population and shall report current and projected waiting lists for long-term care and home and community-based care services. The department is further authorized and directed to prioritize investments in home and community-based care and to maintain the integrity and financial viability of all current long-term care services while pursuing this goal.
- (b) The long-term care re-balancing goal is person-centered and encourages individual self-determination, family involvement, interagency collaboration, and individual choice through the provision of highly specialized and individually tailored home-based services. Additionally, individuals with severe behavioral, physical, or developmental disabilities must have the opportunity to live safe and healthful lives through access to a wide range of supportive services in an array of community-based settings, regardless of the complexity of their medical condition, the severity of their disability, or the challenges of their behavior. Delivery of services and supports in less costly and less restrictive community settings, will enable children, adolescents and adults to be able to curtail, delay or avoid lengthy stays in long-term care institutions, such as behavioral health residential treatment facilities, juvenile detention centers, psychiatric facilities, and/or long-term care hospitals, intermediate care facilities and/or skilled nursing facilities.
- (c) (1) Pursuant to federal authority procured under § 42-7.2-16 of the general laws, the department of human services is directed and authorized to adopt a tiered set of criteria to be used to determine eligibility for services. Such criteria shall be developed in collaboration with the state's health and human services departments and shall encompass need based eligibility determinations for services in nursing facilities, hospitals, and intermediate care facilities for the mentally retarded as well as home institutions for long-term care and community-based

- alternatives, Separate needs based criteria may be established taking into account the long-term care institution for which alternative community-based services and supports are available. The department is authorized to adopt criteria for admission to long-term care institutions that are more stringent than those employed for access to home and community-based services. The department is also authorized to promulgate rules that define the frequency of re-assessments for services provided for under this section.
- (2) The department is authorized, subject to prior approval of the general assembly, to and shall provide a common standard of income financial eligibility for both institutional and home and community-based care. The department is authorized to adopt criteria for admission to a nursing facility, hospital, or intermediate care facility for the mentally retarded that are more stringent than those employed for access to home and community-based services. The department is also authorized to promulgate rules that define the frequency of re-assessments for services provided for under this section. Legislatively approved levels of care may be applied in accordance with the following:
- (i) Any Medicaid recipient deemed eligible for nursing facility, hospital, or intermediate care facility for the mentally retarded as of January 15, 2009, shall continue, throughout that individual's life, to be assessed utilizing the level of care criteria in place for that care as of January 15, 2009;
- (ii) Any Medicaid recipient deemed eligible for home and community services prior to January 15, 2009, shall continue to be assessed for that care utilizing the level of care criteria in place as of January 15, 2009;
- (iii) Persons meeting or who would have met the level of care criteria for nursing facility care as of January 15, 2009, shall continue to be deemed to meet the institutional level of care and shall only be transitioned to home and community services on a voluntary basis, and shall not be subject to any wait list for home and community services; and
- (iv) No resident of a nursing facility, hospital, or intermediate care facility for the mentally retarded shall be removed involuntarily from said facility even if the condition of the resident improves.
- (v) No nursing home, hospital, or intermediate care facility for the mentally retarded shall be denied payment for services rendered to a Medicaid recipient on the grounds that the recipient does not meet level of care criteria unless and until the department of human services has: (i) Performed an individual assessment of the recipient at issue and provided written notice to the nursing home, hospital, or intermediate care facility for the mentally retarded that the recipient does not meet level of care criteria; and (ii) The recipient has either appealed that level of care determination and been unsuccessful, or any appeal period available to the recipient regarding that level of care determination has expired.
- (d) The department of human services is further authorized and directed to consolidate all home and community-based services currently provided pursuant to § 1915(c) of title XIX of the United United States Code into a single program of home and community-based services that include options for consumer direction and shared living. The resulting single home and community-based services program shall replace and supersede all § 1915(c) programs when fully implemented. Notwithstanding the foregoing, the resulting single program home and community-based services program shall include the continued funding of assisted living services at any assisted living facility financed by the Rhode Island housing and mortgage finance corporation prior to January 1, 2006, and shall be in accordance with chapter 66.8 of title 42 of the general laws as long as assisted living services are a covered Medicaid benefit.

- (e) The department of human services is authorized to promulgate rules that permit certain optional services including, but not limited to, homemaker services, home modifications, respite, and physical therapy evaluations to be offered subject to availability of state-appropriated funding for these purposes.
- (f) To promote the expansion of home and community-based service capacity, the department of human services is authorized and directed to pursue rate reform for <u>providers of</u> homemaker, personal care (home health aide) and adult day care services, as follows: (1) A prospective base adjustment effective, not later than July 1, 2008, across all departments and programs, of ten percent (10%) of the existing standard or average rate, contingent upon a demonstrated increase in the state-funded or Medicaid caseload by June 30, 2009;
- (2) Development, not later than September 30, 2008, of certification standards supporting and defining targeted rate increments to encourage service specialization and scheduling accommodations including, but not limited to, medication and pain management, wound management, certified Alzheimer's Syndrome treatment and support programs, and shift differentials for night and week-end services; and
- (3) Development and submission to the governor and the general assembly, not later than December 31, 2008, of a proposed rate-setting methodology for home and community-based services to assure coverage of the base cost of service delivery as well as reasonable coverage of changes in cost caused by wage inflation.
- (h) The department of human services is also authorized, subject to availability of appropriation of funding, to pay for certain non-Medicaid reimbursable expenses necessary to transition residents back to the community; provided, however, payments shall not exceed an annual or per person amount.
  - (i) To assure the continued financial viability of nursing facilities, the department of human services is authorized and directed to develop a proposal for revisions to § 40-8-19 that reflect the changes in cost and resident acuity that result from implementation of this re-balancing goal. Said proposal shall be submitted to the governor and the general assembly on or before January 1, 2010.
  - (ii) SECTION 3. This Article shall take effect upon passage."

I hereby move to amend 2009 -- H 5983 SUBSTITUTE A, entitled "AN ACT MAKING APPROPRIATIONS FOR THE SUPPORT OF THE STATE FOR THE FISCAL YEAR ENDING JUNE 30, 2010", as follows:

By adding thereto the following new Article:

# "ARTICLE

#### RELATING TO PUBLIC OFFICERS AND EMPLOYEES

SECTION 1. Section 36-10-35 of the General Laws in Chapter 36-10 entitled "Retirement System-Contributions and Benefits" is hereby amended to read as follows:

36-10-35. Additional benefits payable to retired employees. -- (a) All state employees and all beneficiaries of state employees receiving any service retirement or ordinary or accidental disability retirement allowance pursuant to the provisions of this title on or before December 31, 1967, shall receive a cost of living retirement adjustment equal to one and one-half percent (1.5%) per year of the original retirement allowance, not compounded, for each calendar year the retirement allowance has been in effect. For the purposes of computation, credit shall be given for a full calendar year regardless of the effective date of the retirement allowance. This cost of

living adjustment shall be added to the amount of the retirement allowance as of January 1, 1968, and an additional one and one-half percent (1.5%) shall be added to the original retirement allowance in each succeeding year during the month of January, and provided further, that this additional cost of living increase shall be three percent (3%) for the year beginning January 1, 1971, and each year thereafter, through December 31, 1980. Notwithstanding any of the above provisions, no employee receiving any service retirement allowance pursuant to the provisions of this title on or before December 31, 1967, or the employee's beneficiary, shall receive any additional benefit hereunder in an amount less than two hundred dollars (\$200) per year over the service retirement allowance where the employee retired prior to January 1, 1958.

- (b) All state employees and all beneficiaries of state employees retired on or after January 1, 1968, who are receiving any service retirement or ordinary or accidental disability retirement allowance pursuant to the provisions of this title shall, on the first day of January next following the third anniversary date of the retirement, receive a cost of living retirement adjustment, in addition to his or her retirement allowance, in an amount equal to three percent (3%) of the original retirement allowance. In each succeeding year thereafter through December 31, 1980, during the month of January, the retirement allowance shall be increased an additional three percent (3%) of the original retirement allowance, not compounded, to be continued during the lifetime of the employee or beneficiary. For the purposes of computation, credit shall be given for a full calendar year regardless of the effective date of the service retirement allowance.
- (c) (1) Beginning on January 1, 1981, for all state employees and beneficiaries of the state employees receiving any service retirement and all state employees, and all beneficiaries of state employees, who have completed at least ten (10) years of contributory service on or before July 1, 2005 pursuant to the provisions of this chapter, and for all state employees, and all beneficiaries of state employees who receive a disability retirement allowance pursuant to sections 36-10-12 -- 36-10-15, the cost of living adjustment shall be computed and paid at the rate of three percent (3%) of the original retirement allowance or the retirement allowance as computed in accordance with section 36-10-35.1, compounded annually from the year for which the cost of living adjustment was determined to be payable by the retirement board pursuant to the provisions of subsection (a) or (b) of this section.
- (2) The provisions of this subsection shall be deemed to apply prospectively only and no retroactive payment shall be made.
- (3) The retirement allowance of all state employees and all beneficiaries of state employees who have not completed at least ten (10) years of contributory service on or before July 1, 2005, shall, on the month following the third anniversary date of retirement, and on the month following the anniversary date of each succeeding year be adjusted and computed by multiplying the retirement allowance by three percent (3%) or the percentage of increase in the Consumer Price Index for all Urban Consumers (CPI-U) as published by the United States Department of Labor Statistics determined as of September 30 of the prior calendar year, whichever is less; the cost of living adjustment shall be compounded annually from the year for which the cost of living adjustment was determined payable by the retirement board; provided, that no adjustment shall cause any retirement allowance to be decreased from the retirement allowance provided immediately before such adjustment. This section shall not apply to all state employees and all beneficiaries of state employees, who receive a disability retirement allowance pursuant to sections 36-10-12 -- 36-10-15.
- (d) (1) All legislators and all beneficiaries of legislators who are receiving a retirement allowance pursuant to the provisions of section 36-10-9.1 for a period of three (3) or more years,

shall, commencing January 1, 1982, receive a cost of living retirement adjustment, in addition to a retirement allowance, in an amount equal to three percent (3%) of the original retirement allowance. In each succeeding year thereafter during the month of January, the retirement allowance shall be increased an additional three percent (3%) of the original retirement allowance, compounded annually, to be continued during the lifetime of the legislator or beneficiary. For the purposes of computation, credit shall be given for a full calendar year regardless of the effective date of the service retirement allowance.

- (e) The provisions of sections 45-13-7 -- 45-13-10 shall not apply to this section.
- (f) Notwithstanding the above language, any state employee who receives a service retirement in excess of one hundred thousand dollars (\$100,000) shall not be eligible for any cost of living retirement adjustment in addition to a retirement allowance.

SECTION 2. This Article shall take effect upon passage."

- 42-12-23.2. Expenditure of American Recovery and Reinvestment Act of 2009 Funds. (a) The department of human services is hereby authorized to expend funds received for child care as part of the American Recovery and Reinvestment Act of 2009 (ARRA) to provide child care subsidies on a sliding fee scale basis to otherwise eligible families whose income is between one hundred eighty percent (180%) and two hundred percent (200%) of the applicable federal poverty guidelines.
- (b) The authority of the department of human services shall continue until the later in time of: (1) September 30, 2011; or (2) The depletion of American Recovery and Reinvestment Act Funds."
