RELATING TO INSURANCE - ORALLY ADMINISTERED ANTICANCER MEDICATION

It is enacted by the General Assembly as follows:

1 SECTION 1. Chapter 27-18 of the General Laws entitled "Accident and Sickness 2 Insurance Policies" is hereby amended by adding thereto the following section: 3 27-18-79. Orally administered anticancer medication - Coverage mandated. -- Every 4 individual or group hospital or medical expense, insurance policy or individual or group hospital 5 or medical services plan contract, plan or certificate of insurance delivered, issued for delivery, or renewed in this state shall provide coverage for prescribed, orally administered anticancer 6 7 medications used to kill or slow the growth of cancerous cells on a basis no less favorable than 8 intravenously administered or injected cancer medications that are covered as medical benefits. 9 An increase in patient cost sharing for anticancer medications shall not be allowed to achieve 10 compliance with this section. 11 SECTION 2. Chapter 27-19 of the General Laws entitled "Individual Health Insurance 12 Coverage" is hereby amended by adding thereto the following section: 13 27-19-70. Orally administered anticancer medication – Coverage mandated. -- Every 14 individual or group hospital or medical expense, insurance policy or individual or group hospital

or medical services plan contract, plan or certificate of insurance delivered, issued for delivery, or

renewed in this state shall provide coverage for prescribed, orally administered anticancer

medications used to kill or slow the growth of cancerous cells on a basis no less favorable than

intravenously administered or injected cancer medications that are covered as medical benefits.

17	delivery, or renewed in this state shall provide coverage for prescribed, orally administered
18	anticancer medications used to kill or slow the growth of cancerous cells on a basis no less
19	favorable than intravenously administered or injected cancer medications that are covered as
20	medical benefits. An increase in patient cost sharing for anticancer medications shall not be
21	allowed to achieve compliance with this section.
22	SECTION 5. This act shall take effect upon passage.

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EXPLANATION

BY THE LEGISLATIVE COUNCIL

OF

AN ACT

RELATING TO INSURANCE - ORALLY ADMINISTERED ANTICANCER MEDICATION

This act would require insurance coverage for prescribed, orally administered anticancer medication just as there is coverage for intravenously administered or injected anticancer medications.

This act would take effect upon passage.

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
