RELATING TO HUMAN SERVICES-HOMELESS SHELTERS

SECTION 1. Title 40 of the General Laws entitled "HUMAN SERVICES" is hereby

It is enacted by the General Assembly as follows:

3	CHAPTER 17.1
4	HOMELESS SHELTERS
5	40-17.1-1. Legislative findings The general assembly hereby finds:
6	(1) That all homeless persons have the right to homeless shelter services regardless of
7	political or religious beliefs, immigration status, former geographic location of residence, ethno-
8	cultural background, disability, gender identity, criminal background, and/or sexual orientation;
9	(2) That no shelter should charge a fee nor expect and/or require compensation from
10	clients/residents for any services rendered;
11	(3) Homeless shelters should provide an atmosphere of dignity and respect for all shelter
12	residents, and provide services in a non-judgmental manner;
13	(4) That shelter residents are capable of moving toward increasing levels of self-reliance
14	and self-determination. Shelter staff should work with residents to assist them in achieving their
15	goals;
16	(5) Homeless shelters should be sensitive to the ethno-specific and linguistic needs of
17	residents;
18	(6) Service providers need to accept gender identity as defined by the individual rather
19	than by the perception of staff and/or other residents;

1	(1) Protecting the privacy and confidentiality of shelter residents and their personal
2	information is of the utmost importance and in accordance with the state's homeless bill of rights
3	<u>law as set forth in §34-37.1-3;</u>
4	(8) That all people staying in homeless shelters should have access to safe, nutritious
5	<u>food;</u>
6	(9) That the health and safety of shelter residents, volunteers, and staff is of the highest
7	importance in each shelter;
8	(10) That issuing service restrictions in the shelter system must be done only as a last
9	resort and in the most serious cases;
10	(11) That everyone is entitled to shelter service whether or not they use substances and
11	policies should not be based on substance use alone, except for those shelters operating on an
12	abstinence or recovery model basis;
13	(12) Shelter residents should be involved in service provision, program planning,
14	development and evaluation, and policy development;
15	(13) Homeless shelters that include children and youth should provide supports and
16	activities and ensure that the school related recreation and treatment needs of resident children are
17	met on site or through community based services;
18	(14) Homeless shelters should afford an opportunity for children and youth with
19	developmental and/or physical disabilities to develop to their full potential within an environment
20	where they can interact and socialize with other children;
21	(15) That shelters are part of a larger network of homeless services and agencies and
22	collaboration within this network is important to ensure effective and coordinated services;
23	(16) That notification of shelter closure (either emergency or permanent shelter) should
24	be done as soon as the provider is aware of the potential closure and posted in a common area.
25	Providers should notify their residents as well as the office of housing and community
26	development (OHCD); and,
27	(17) That all shelters should utilize the Rhode Island Homeless Information Management
28	System (HMIS) database, and make entries in a timely manner.
29	40-17.1-2. Appointment of committee to establish regulations for homeless shelters-
30	powers and duties (a) The housing resources commission shall establish and promulgate
31	regulations for the safe, effective, and proper operation of homeless shelters for individuals and
32	families in the state. The chair of the housing resources commission shall appoint a committee to
33	draft regulations for homeless shelters. Each member of the committee will be drawn from the
34	following constituencies or communities of interest:

1	(1) One nomeress of formerty nomeress person,
2	(2) Two (2) representatives of the Rhode Island Homeless Advocacy Project;
3	(3) One representative of the Rhode Island Coalition for the Homeless;
4	(4) Two (2) homeless shelter providers operating a shelter for individuals;
5	(5) Two (2) homeless shelter providers operating a shelter for families;
6	(6) One representative from the Rhode Island office of housing and community
7	development;
8	(7) One domestic violence shelter provider; and
9	(8) One resident or former resident of a domestic violence shelter. The committee will
10	elect a chair or co-chairs from among the membership.
11	(b) The committee will define the characteristics of a homeless shelter that will be subject
12	to the regulations and standards established by this chapter.
13	(c) The committee will be charged with the formulation of regulations and standards to
14	address the following topics and areas of concern:
15	(1) Baseline organizational standards that any agency operating a homeless shelter must
16	meet;
17	(2) Access to shelter guidelines, including admission and discharge, bed registration,
18	substance use, and service restrictions (barrings);
19	(3) Residents' rights and responsibilities, including resident input, complaints and
20	appeals, and grievance procedures;
21	(4) Program standards including the provision of essential services, counseling supports,
22	daytime access, confidentiality, sharing of resident information, safeguarding resident files, and
23	staff code of conduct;
24	(5) Health and safety standards including basic health and safety protocols, the safeguard
25	of, and access to, resident medication, a policy on weapons, and requirements for staff training on
26	health and safety issues;
27	(6) Emergency and winter shelter standards including the definition of inclement weather
28	events, in all seasons, that trigger requirements for homeless shelters to stay open for the
29	protection of residents.
30	(d) Draft regulations will be subject to the state's regulatory approval process.
31	(e) Except to the extent specifically required by statute, no shelter shall deny access to, or
32	otherwise impose additional restrictions upon individuals due to their being subject to community
33	notification requirements, nor shall any state or municipal agency request or require a shelter to
34	impose any such restrictions.

- 1 (f) Upon completion of the regulatory approval process, the HRC and/or the OHCD are
- 2 <u>hereby mandated to implement and enforce the approved regulations.</u>
- 3 SECTION 2. This act shall take effect upon passage.
