# AN ACT

### RELATING TO EDUCATION - LOW AND MODERATE INCOME HOUSING

Introduced By: Representatives Morin, Maldonado, Phillips, Carson, and Casey

It is enacted by the General Assembly as follows:

SECTION 1. Section 16-7.2-3 of the General Laws in Chapter 16-7.2 entitled "The

2 Education Equity and Property Tax Relief Act" is hereby amended to read as follows:

#### 16-7.2-3. Permanent foundation education aid established.

(a) Beginning in the 2012 fiscal year, the following foundation education-aid formula shall take effect. The foundation education aid for each district shall be the sum of the core

instruction amount in subdivision (a)(1) and the amount to support high-need students in

subdivision (a)(2), which shall be multiplied by the district state-share ratio calculated pursuant to

§ 16-7.2-4 to determine the foundation aid.

(1) The core-instruction amount shall be an amount equal to a statewide, per-pupil core-

instruction amount as established by the department of elementary and secondary education,

derived from the average of northeast regional expenditure data for the states of Rhode Island,

12 Massachusetts, Connecticut, and New Hampshire from the National Center for Education

13 Statistics (NCES) that will adequately fund the student instructional needs as described in the

basic education program and multiplied by the district average daily membership as defined in §

16-7-22. Expenditure data in the following categories: instruction and support services for

students, instruction, general administration, school administration, and other support services

from the National Public Education Financial Survey, as published by NCES, and enrollment data

from the Common Core of Data, also published by NCES, will be used when determining the

core-instruction amount. The core-instruction amount will be updated annually. For the purpose

1	of calculating this formula, school districts' resident average daily membership shall exclude
2	charter school and state-operated school students.
3	(2) The amount to support high-need students beyond the core-instruction amount shall
4	be determined by multiplying a student success factor of forty percent (40%) by the core
5	instruction per-pupil amount described in subdivision (a)(1) and applying that amount for each
6	resident child whose family income is at or below one hundred eighty-five percent (185%) of
7	federal poverty guidelines, hereinafter referred to as "poverty status."
8	(b) Local education agencies (LEA) may set aside a portion of funds received under
9	subsection (a) to expand learning opportunities such as after school and summer programs, full-
10	day kindergarten and/or multiple pathway programs, provided that the basic education program
11	and all other approved programs required in law are funded.
12	(c) The department of elementary and secondary education shall promulgate such
13	regulations as are necessary to implement fully the purposes of this chapter.
14	(d) The provisions of §45-53-10 shall be applied after the yearly amount of education aid
15	provided for under subsection (a) of this section is calculated.
16	SECTION 2. Chapter 45-53 of the General Laws entitled "Low and Moderate Income
17	Housing" is hereby amended by adding thereto the following section:

8	(3) The division of planning of the department of administration shall certify to the
9	general assembly on or before April 1 of each year as to the percentage and amount of low-
10	income housing in a municipality as of the previous year, for purposes of implementing this
11	section.
12	(b) As used herein:
13	(1) "Community" means the municipality or municipalities serviced by, a part of, or in a
14	given school district; and
15	(2) "Education aid" means the permanent foundation education aid received by each
16	school district established pursuant to the provisions of chapter 7.2 of title 16, "the education
17	equity and property tax relief act."
18	SECTION 2. This act shall take effect on January 1, 2018.

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This act would provide for increases in the amount of foundation level school support that a community would receive, based upon a community's ability to meet and surpass its minimum low and moderate income housing requirements.

This act would take effect on January 1, 2018.

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
