RELATING TO INSURANCE -- ACCIDENT AND SICKNESS INSURANCE POLICIES

It is enacted by the General Assembly as follows:

1 SECTION 1. Chapter 27-18 of the General Laws entitled "Accident and Sickness Insurance 2 Policies" is hereby amended by adding thereto the following section: 3

27-18-85. Health insurance contracts - Coverage for prescription drugs.

Commencing January 1, 2022, every health insurance issuer offering group or individual health insurance coverage that provides benefit expenses in the purchase of prescription drugs in a policy executed, renewed, issued or delivered in the state shall limit a covered person's out-ofpocket responsibility, including any copayments or coinsurance, for prescription drugs, including specialty drugs, to no more than one hundred dollars (\$100) per month for a specialty or prescription drug for up to a thirty (30) day supply of any single drug.

SECTION 2. Chapter 27-19 of the General Laws entitled "Nonprofit Hospital Service Corporations" is hereby amended by adding thereto the following section:

27-19-77. Health insurance contracts - Coverage for prescription drugs.

Commencing January 1, 2022, every health insurance issuer offering group or individual health insurance coverage that provides benefit expenses in the purchase of prescription drugs in a policy executed, renewed, issued or delivered in the state shall limit a covered person's out-ofpocket responsibility, including any copayments or coinsurance, for prescription drugs, including specialty drugs, to no more than one hundred dollars (\$100) per month for a specialty or prescription drug for up to a thirty (30) day supply of any single drug.

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EXPLANATION

BY THE LEGISLATIVE COUNCIL

RELATING TO INSURANCE -- ACCIDENT AND SICKNESS INSURANCE POLICIES

1 This act would require all health insurance providers offering prescription drug benefits to 2 limit a covered person's out-of-pocket financial responsibility for prescription and specialty drugs 3 to no more than one hundred dollars (\$100) per month for up to a thirty (30) day supply for any 4 single drug, commencing January 1, 2022. This act would take effect upon passage. 5

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
