8	shall be permitted to treat EMS patients when medically necessary and appropriate. Such treatment
9	shall be permitted to occur in the community.
10	(c) Rhode Island Medicaid and its contracted managed care entities shall provide coverage
11	for transportation and treatment described in subsection (b) of this section and shall reimburse such
12	services at a rate not lower than the same service would have been had that service been delivered
13	in a traditional office setting.
14	(d) The executive office of health and human services and/or the department of health may
15	promulgate such rules and regulations as are necessary and proper to effectuate the purpose and for
16	the efficient administration and enforcement of this chapter.
17	SECTION 6. This act shall take effect upon passage.

EXPLANATION

BY THE LEGISLATIVE COUNCIL

AN ACT

RELATING TO INSURANCE -- ACCIDENT AND SICKNESS INSURANCE POLICIES

This act would require health insurers, nonprofit hospital service corporations, nonprofit
medical service corporations, health maintenance organizations and Rhode Island Medicaid, to
issue or renew policies that provide coverage for emergency medical services transport to alternate
facilities and coverage of emergency medical services, mental health and substance use disorder
treatment, on or after January 1, 2023.

This act would take effect upon passage.
