It is enacted by the General Assembly as follows:

- 1 SECTION 1. Chapter 9-19 of the General Laws entitled "Evidence" is hereby amended by
- 2 adding thereto the following section:

### 9-19-45. Fair and reasonable charge for medical and healthcare services in all civil

4 actions.

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5 In all civil actions now or hereinafter pending in any court, agency, arbitration forum, or

6 other tribunal based upon a cause of action for injury or for wrongful death, including causes of

7 action based upon medical, dental, or professional malpractice, the fair and reasonable charge for

8 medical, hospital, therapeutic, and other health care services shall be the amount billed by the

- 9 licensed health care provider. The amount paid to the licensed health care provider by any health,
- 10 accident or disability insurer, any state or federal health insurance or disability program, any
- 11 medical payments or personal injury protection insurance, or any workers' compensation benefits,
- 12 and the acceptance thereof by the licensed health care provider in full satisfaction of the amount
- 13 <u>billed</u>, shall be inadmissible as evidence of the fair and reasonable charge for such services.
- 14 SECTION 2. This act shall take effect upon passage.

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1 This act would prohibit the introduction into court proceedings of any evidence that the

2 fair and reasonable charge for healthcare services is the amount received by the healthcare provider

- 3 rather than the amount billed by healthcare providers.
- 4 This act would take effect upon passage.

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
